- How can we link these mechanisms with national sovereignty, the keystone of international legal agreements?




Problematic of International Waters

- Ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Non-Navigational Uses of International Watercourses
- Needs to anticipate future disputes

Sovereignty over Water


- Internal and External Sovereignty
